















Angels with special wings

- Take a sheet of white paper, put out enough paint in the flat part of an egg carton as to fit your hand into it (use a plate or just paint your hand with a brush).
- 2. Make an imprint of both hands on the paper touching at the middle of the wrists.
- 3. Allow handprints to dry
- 4. Take the doilie, paper plate or circle and cut from the edge into the centre.
- 5. Make the paper into a cone shape and secure with a staple or sticky tape. If using the recycled cup ensure it is clean, turn it upside down and decorate it.
- 6. Cut out the hands leaving a white edge around them these will be the wings.
- 7. Secure the cotton ball to the top of the paper cone or upside down cup with glue or sticky tape.
- 8. Fold the handprints back to form the angel wings and attach to the cone.

TIP: Using doilies in paper art & craft projects

Paper doilies were once a common house hold item. They have intricate patterns cut outs and escalloped edges. Doilies are typically circular and come in different sizes.

Back them with light tissue paper so the colour can be seen through the cut out shapes.

Use them as pattern makers:

- Place doilie on top of paper painting through take off doilie
- Take a sheet of paper and cover an area with glue. Place the doilie on top and sprinkle glue through the shapes. Shake off access glitter into a container for

Use the **optional extras** to collage and decorate the body, eyes, feet just remind them they are making angels.

Further creative fun: Ask your kids to think about what other Christmas or seasonal characters they could make? How can they show the character? Have fun experiment.
